






Pakenham Show, P.B Ronald Reserve

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Driver Training Program



The initial aim of the club is to ensure that all members are proficient 4 wheel drivers.

To assist in this end, our club has a driver education program for new members. The training is run by our own qualified training team.

The team members are very experienced members of the club in touring, and offroading in general. They are there to help people become familiar with their vehicle, with safe four wheel driving techniques, with the various equipment that is available, and to promote responsible bush driving and touring.

Our other aim is to enable people to gain the knowledge and confidence in all aspects of four wheel driving to travel safely and be prepared.

This training is included in your membership fees. Private courses similar to the one provided by our fully accredited training team, may cost hundreds of dollars.

The Driver Education Program is held as a weekend course at the Club Property with theory and practical exercises.

These are some of the points that the course includes:

- Ascending and Descending Steep Hills.
- Recovery Procedures.
- Safety aspects of Vehicle Packing.
- General Tips and Techniques.
- Correct Preparation for Water Hazards.
- Correct Use of Communications Equipment.
- Use and Care of Recovery Equipment.



Who should complete Driver Training?

While the primary driver must do Driver Training, we also encourage partners to complete the training. This will give them more confidence in the vehicles capabilities as well as give them the experience needed should they need to take over driving at any time. Please talk to the Driver Training coordinator about these options and any other members of your family that may benefit the training.

How to register for training?

If you are already a registered member have a look at the dates available in magazine or website when Driver Training is being held. Contact the Driver Training coordinator to make a booking and discuss options.





Wandarrah is a great destination to relax and enjoy bush camping with a few luxuries. We arrived there on Wednesday to make sure the gate was open when others arrived as we had a few associate members and guests attending. We got there to find that Tino had come down a day earlier so everything was open, so that was great.



While it did rain a bit on the way down it stopped at the property and Tino said that it had not rained while he was there. Well we had just enough time to set up camp and down it came. It basically rained the rest of the day. Sarah recorded the





rain gauge setting and noticed that there was 76mm of rain since the 4 Dec (last recorded). She checked the gauge around 8pm later that night and we had 11mm since we had been there.

Tino showed me the hole in the stairs that has eroded and we needed to get it fixed as there will be people camping in Lower Wandarrah and I didn't want any incidents. So a few of us got together with a trailer in tow and grabbed some rocks that the grader had put onto the side of the main track. It took a lot of rocks to fill and after the blue stones were put back on the top you would have never known there was a hole there. Great teamwork. Hopefully that holds for a while.

Over the next 4 days people trickled into the property as not everyone came at the start. David Armitage dropped in for a few hours on NYE to have a chat with everyone which was great.

There were lots of day trips to various local locations. These were either single or multiple car trips so people got out and visited the local area. A few sunset trips to Pearson's point were great and gave the new members a look over the awesome area we have on offer.

Wendy, Shane, Pauline and Ash had a day trip up to Valencia Creek where Wendy showed the others her old stomping grounds for motorbike riding and camping. They also visited blue pools and had lunch at the Briagolong pub.

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We had one trip to Huggetts Crossing as we intended to cross the Avon and head up the hill but looking at the Avon we decided the crossing was a bit hazardous and we didn't need that grief. I didn't get any pictures but the Avon had been carved out a bit (now deeper in the middle) and the amount of sand that had moved into the area was amazing. There were no rocks on the shore any more, it was all sand. The big rocks that were put across the river had been moved a few metres, but the biggest thing of all were the rocks up on the bank to stop people driving to the swimming pools that were now covered with sand. We finally did a 4x4 trip on the final day (NYE), it was decided to head the the western side of the range which is called Monomak/Gillum area. I have a loop that I do with beginners which puts them out of their comfort zone just a bit and allows them to see the capabilities of their vehicle.

I did notice a bit of erosion on the first hill which revealed a lot of rock face so definitely 1st gear for this one. The others were steeper but they had ruts to drive, only issue with this was one of the cars was not

lifted so Michael had an interesting time getting over one of the washouts but with a bit of wheel spinning and eventually traction control he got over.

The tracks were definitely overgrown and pin striping was the in thing. That's four wheel driving for you. Arrived back at camp by 6pm ready for NYE festivities.

Rosie had organised a happy hour which was great, that was in full swing when we arrived back.

A few days earlier people were talking about smores and making them as there were a few that had not eaten them before. I opened my big mouth and said I have the best way to make them. Smores were enjoyed by all.

With long distances, comes long driving days. The chatter on the radio made the days go fast and the laughter generated from random comments cemented memories for us all. Some mechanical issues meant that the original itinerary was changed and the wet weather in the lead up to our arrival also meant some tracks were closed/un-driveable.

Although unplanned, the routes we did drive were very enjoyable and the routes not driven provide an incentive to re-visit the area again!

Day 1 (3/6/2023) to Cobar: 770km

7.30am scheduled to meet at Kalkallo waiting for trip leader some arriving super early (hey Stu?)

We arrive at the meeting point on a rainy, cold Melbourne morning. Whilst the group arrived on time, we were left waiting for someone to arrive before we could head off.... Yeah, we needed that one!

We were to meet some of our crew in Cairns – a couple of the team had left earlier to holiday with partners ahead of the Cape trip and we were to meet them in sunny Queensland.



Submitting a Trip Report

I have recently had members ask me how to write a trip report. As trip reports are a fundamental part of the magazine, it's great when members want to share their interesting experiences with the club community.

The general rule of thumb when submitting a report is to provide as much relevant information as possible. For example:

- Specify whether it's Club or Personal Trip.
- Trip name and date.
- Participants on Trip.

- Photos.
- Trip report text.
- Selfie or avatar if you prefer.

When I receive your details I will create a proof of your report and send it to you for changes or approval.

When you write your report, do it from your perspective, how you experienced the trip from start to finish. I find it helpful to look at the map or GPS file as well as photos to jog those memories.


